BACKGROUND

The Education Scholarship Programme (ESP) was established in response to the growing need of adequate support for children living in poverty and/or experiencing economic hardship to remain in school and further their education. Students enrolled in the Programme are provided with scholarships to cover tuition fees and receive additional assistance in the form of career guidance, life skills training and support through other CNCF's Programmes. The Education Scholarship Programme enables vulnerable children and young adults to remain in the education system as well as enhancing awareness on the importance of education and empowering the students and their families to break the cycle of poverty, not only for themselves, but for their future generations to come.

BENEFICIARIES

Students from disadvantaged backgrounds wanting to pursue or remain in the education system. The children in this programme are often orphans, street children living with relatives, children coming from low-income households, families affected by the acute financial hardships caused by a serious accident or illness to the primary income earner, children of large families whose parents are physically impaired or children from other CNCF programmes who want to pursue higher education.

The students' progress is closely monitored by CNCF Social Workers and timely support is provided when necessary. Prior to enrolment, and if issues arise, the Education Scholarship Programme Manager and Social Workers conduct home visits to the students' families. CNCF Board of Management and ESP staff organise weekly internal meetings for programme discussions. Monthly reports and semi-annual reports are provided to the Board of Management and an Annual Review of the programme is made available to all stakeholders.

OUR YEAR

In 2023, CNCF's Education Scholarship Programme (ESP) continued to provide financial support to students, enabling them to remain in and pursue their education at Primary, Secondary, High School, College, University, and Vocational levels.

This was a special year as CNCF, a British Registered Charity operating in Vietnam for 34 years, celebrated 50 years of diplomatic relations between the United Kingdom and Vietnam. CNCF was therefore honoured to host two scholarship ceremonies for this year's recipients at the British Consulate General in Ho Chi Minh City in 2023. The ceremonies were attended by representatives from our local government partners, university partners, and distinguished donors, as well as, most importantly, 100 beneficiary students who made this initiative truly special.

CNCF also welcomed representatives from two significant ESP partners, Furniture Industry for Education (FIFE) and the Wednesday Afternoon Golf Society (WAGS), who had the opportunity to meet many of the children and young people they are supporting through the programme.

6,267 STUDENTS

BACKGROUND

The Christina Noble Education Programme (CNEP) was established in response to the issues of substandard pedagogy and high dropout rates in Vietnam. The Programme helps students from disadvantaged backgrounds realise their dreams in a rapidly changing local and global employment market by bridging the gap between their educational and professional lives. The CNEP enables vulnerable young people to remain in the education system and empowers them with progressive soft skills through four components; Scholarship: providing financial support for students to complete their university education; Fellowship: providing 100 hours of intensive training to strengthen competences that are aligned to the global development goals, preparing students with essential skills and mindsets for future careers; Internship: connecting students to professional workplaces to apply competences at work and Mentorship: connecting students with experienced mentors for real-field consultancy.

BENEFICIARIES

Final year University students from disadvantaged backgrounds who have achieved outstanding academic results and show potential for leadership or a commitment to social impact

OUR YEAR

The Christina Noble Education Programme (CNEP) was initiated and proposed by CNCF in response to the needs of disadvantaged youth. At the national level, the Programme addresses high youth unemployment and employment retention across the country. At an individual level, the programme aims to empower Vietnam's youth, and future leaders of the country, to overcome professional barriers and enable them to thrive in the 21st century labour market, achieve their dreams by cultivating professional skills, mindset and learning ability.

In October 2023, the CNEP was officially launched, welcoming its inaugural cohort of 60 students from seven universities across Ho Chi Minh City, An Giang Province, and Ben Tre Province in Vietnam. This launch coincided with the commemoration of 50 years of diplomatic relations between the United Kingdom and Vietnam, marking a special milestone. In honour of this occasion, CNCF was privileged to joint host the scholarship launch ceremony with CNCF's ESP ceremony at the British Consulate General in Ho Chi Minh City.

The last quarter of 2023 saw the initiation of the Fellowship component of the programme, highlighted by a series of training sessions and networking activities. This period also marked the start of collaborations with various prestigious partners, including universities and educational service organisations, setting a significant milestone in the programme's implementation.

Participants also developed their learning in confident demeanour, intercultural communication skills, and self-compassion. Additionally, the programme enhanced time management, interview techniques, job application writing, and presentation skills. Leadership, initiative, social responsibility, teamwork, gender sensitivity, emotional balance, bravery, perseverance, growth mindset, and positive thinking were also emphasised

43 STUDENTS

secured internships in their chosen career sectors with the remaining being matched in 2024

were matched with their individual mentors through the Vietnam Alumni Mentoring Network (VAM). Post programme, mentors continue their support until mentees secure stable employment, guiding them through their transition from university to the professional world.

She grew up in a mud-walled home until her family received a modest charity house through government support. During her second year at university, Ngoc was diagnosed with thyroid cancer. She underwent two surgeries and received radiation therapy at the Ho Chi Minh City Cancer Hospital, supported by CNCF's Medical Assistance Programme.
